### **Darts Hill**

Lorna Fraser explained that she is the club’s representative on the Darts Hill Garden Conservancy Trust Society, a three year position. This year the garden has been open on a much more frequent basis. On Friday, 29 September and 20 October there are Director’s Tours from 1:15 to 3:30 pm. On Saturday, 30 September and 21 October there are Garden Strolls from 11 am until 3 pm. Sunday 15 October is Member’s Day from 11 am until 3 pm. Thursday 19 October there is a work party for native plants from 9 to 12. So there are many opportunities to visit the garden which are all displayed on the Darts Hill website. Additionally, there is a golf cart available for visitors who need it and people can arrange for their own tour for a small fee.
